



#### Look Who is Doing Great Work in White Plains!



The White Plains Community Youth Court was launched in 2013 as alternative to incarceration pro-gram to divert first time youth offenders from a lifetime in the juvenile justice system. The Youth Court is run in consultation with the Department of Probation

and the Family Courts. Cases are processed in Youth Court and a jury of youth peers hand down sanctions after a hearing. All court positions from Judge, Jury, Attorneys, Bailiff are filled by trained High School students. Sanctions range from community service, remedial classes and letters of apology. Trainings are held during the Summer months and cases are heard during the school year. To date the White Plains Community Youth Court has had a 100% success rate in diverting the youthful offenders to more positive activities.
