Macy Award Presented to Allan Houston

WCA's Edith C. Macy Award for Distinguished Service was presented by Board President Cathy Draper and Executive Director Cora Greenberg to Allan Houston, former NBA All-Star, and currently the General Manager of the Westchester Knicks, and the Assistant General Manager of the NY Knicks. Allan was selected in recognition of his efforts to support the role of fathers in their children's lives. In accepting the award, Allan connected his feelings about his own children with WCA's mission, saying:

"As Cora mentioned, my wife and I have 7 children...mornings can be a bit chaotic in our household. But we try to take a moment each morning to come together and share a moment of reflection and devotional prayer. I realize that what my wife and I hope for our own children, is just what WCA envisions for all children: to be healthy, safe and prepared for life's challenges. In this, there is hope for the future that is destined for them."

Near the close of the event, guests cheered the very exciting announcement of a Legacy Gift made by Centennial Campaign Co-Chair Maris Krasnow and her husband Jesse. They informed WCA that they have included a \$100,000 bequest to the organization in their will. Like all bequests, theirs will be used to build WCA's Endowment Fund, which is critical to WCA's uninterrupted work on behalf of the county's youth. It allows

RAISE the AGE NY

UPDATE & TIMELINE

WCA staff and community advocates have continued to push for comprehensive Raise the Age legislation in New York in 2016. Westchester Children's Association, along with our many partners in the Raise the Age-NY campaign, once again secured funding for

raise the age reforms in the 2016-2017 New York State budget but not the enabling legislation. We will continue to call on the New York State Senate, Assembly and Governor Cuomo to pass reform by the end of the legislative session in mid-June.



February 19, 2016

WCA and Child Care Council of Westchester hosted our annual Legislative Breakfast where Raise the Age was one of three topics discussed. Eddie shared his experience being arrested as an adult at 17.

March 1, 2016

WCA Program and Policy Associate Sarah Yergeau appeared on View Point cable access show hosted by Lillian Neuman.



March 8, 2016

45 Westchester residents and youth joined over 200 others from around the state to rally for Raise the Age legislation in Albany. Young adults from the Youth Shelter Program of Westchester, the White Plains Youth Court, Children's Village, and Bravehearts M.O.V.E. New York had the opportunity to meet with elected officials and staff to ask them to make raising the age of criminal responsibility for 16 and 17 year olds a top priority in the New York State budget.

May 10, 2016

Over 35 faith leaders from across Westchester County released a letter to Governor Cuomo, Majority Leader Flanagan and Speaker Heastie urging them to raise the age by the end of the legislative session in June.

New Project Manager Erica Ayala has seamlessly taken the helm of our GPS4kids initiative. On March 15, 2016, over 50 GPS4Kids Community Partners met and discussed the top ranked Actions, Solutions, and Responses (ASRs). Those in attendance voted on their top ASR and spent time in small groups detailing existing and potential interventions. Going forward the ASRs will help identify the starting point for our action plan.

Community partners working together to come up with our 3 goals for GPS4Kids.

The top three GPS4Kids actions, solutions and responses (ASRs) were identified:



Strengthening youth-adult relationships and family supports

Create programs that help parents connect with their children and teens (in their native language); building health attachments (child/parent relationships) which contribute to improved school success and age-appropriate parent engagement in their kids' lives.



Creating opportunities for children to thrive regardless of race or zip code

Joint effort to promote equity across school districts regarding support for at risk or disruptive students, creative solutions to "disruptive" issues and advocacy for the alliance for equality ruling i.e. "solutions not suspensions."



Fostering social and emotional well-being through healthy peer relationships, and prevention and treatment of drug and alcohol abuse.

Expand community mental health funding for "Early Step Forward" so it can be taken to scale. More continuity from Head Start to high school.

What's Next

As an important continuation of their voice from the November '15 forum a youth-specific stakeholder meeting on May 25th was designed to receive useful feedback from youth stakeholders and incorporate youth voice into the overall GPS4Kids process.
